tained and dry, allowing you to set out on Wednesday night. The free lids are funded in part by the Petoskey-Harbor Springs Area Community Foundation.

**Lids are available only for the larger green recycling totes (with handles molded into all four sides of the rim). If you have the smaller green totes (with handles only on the two ends), you can trade them in for the larger lidded totes at the DPW office in the County Building at 200 Division Street, downtown. Alternately you can keep the smaller totes and add a larger lidded tote or totes. Call 348-0640 for more information.*

Can't Cart

Last summer, most Petoskey-area residents received rolling carts for curbside recycling of Paper, Boxes and Bags. Unfortunately, the recycling trucks capable of emptying those carts are too large for Bay View's road system, so Bay View cottages will not be serviced with carts. Please continue to set your recyclables out in your green totes:

Paper, Boxes and Bags in one, Bottles and Containers (plastic, metal, glass, and paper cartons) in another (or several totes

for each, as needed).

Brought to You By: Our curbside recycling service is funded by Bear Creek Township and operated by Emmet County Recycling the same folks who bring you the green-bin recycling drop site at D&W (formerly Glen's North) and the Drop-off Center on Pleasantview Road. For your recycling convenience, we have more drop sites.

Have large cardboard? Leaving town before your curbside recycling day? Use Emmet County's Recycling Drop Sites, open 24/7! Of course, the closest is located in the D&W Plaza, just north of the golf course. But there are two relatively new ones that may prove handy.

Going downtown? There is a drop site behind the Petoskey News-Review building (in the parking lot at the corner of Howard and Michigan streets).

Heading south? A new site has been installed in Bear Creek Crossings, the mall with Lowe's. Look for the site, tucked in the corner between Pet Supplies Plus and Anytime Fitness.

Shred Boxes of Documents: When it's time to get rid of long-term files on taxes, legal matters, medical care and the like, Emmet County Recycling is at your service. The Drop-off Center now has a shredder on site and shredding service is offered weekly by appointment. Cost is \$5 per copy paper box/bankers box or two grocery bags full. Worship Speaker Philip Yancey in Bay View July 9

A native of Atlanta, Georgia, Philip Yancey earned graduate degrees in Communications and English from Wheaton College and the University of Chicago. He joined the staff of Campus Life Magazine in 1971, and worked there for ten years as Editor and then Publisher.

Then Philip became a full-time writer, initially working as a journalist for such varied publications as Reader's Digest, National Wildlife, Christian Century and The Reformed Journal. For many

years he wrote a monthly column for Christianity Today magazine, which he still serves as Editor at Large.

He has written over twenty-five books, including *Where Is God When It Hurts*, *Prayer: Does It Make Any Difference?* and *Disappointment with God*. The books have won thirteen Gold Medallion Awards from the Christian Publishers Association and have sold more than fifteen million copies in English, as well as being translated into forty languages. Christian bookstore managers selected

The Jesus I Never Knew as the 1996 Book of the Year, and *What's So Amazing About Grace?* received the same award in 1998. Among his most recent books are *The Question That Never Goes Away* and *Vanishing Grace: What Ever Happened to the Good News?*.

The Yanceys lived in downtown Chicago before moving to a very different environment in Colorado. They enjoy mountain climbing, skiing, wildlife, and all the other delights of the Rocky Mountains.

Eric Hemenway Speaks at Bay View Scarrow Forum on Indigenous Communities in the 21st Century

Friday, July 14, in Loud Hall in Bay View Eric Hemenway will speak on "Native America Today: A Look at Indigenous Communities in the 21st Century." The presentation which will take place from 10:00-11:00 a.m. is free and open to the public. Eric is an Anishnaabe/Odawa from Cross Village, Michigan and is the Director of Repatriation, Archives and Records for the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians. He oversees the management and preservation of historic documents



and materials for the tribe, as well as working with Archives staff on utilizing those materials in educational initiatives, such as; museum exhibits, curriculum building, publications, historical interpretation, signage, web content and presentations.

Eric has also extensive work experience under the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act. Collaborations on exhibits have included the National Park Service, State of Michigan, Mackinac State Historic Parks, Emmet County and the Harbor Springs History Museum. Eric has worked on over 30 successful repatriations of ancestral Anishnaabek human remains from within Michigan

during his time at LTBB Odawa. He currently sits on The Michigan Heritage Committee, The Michigan Humanities Council, Michigan Historical Society, Emmet County Historical Commission and is on the board of trustees for the Harbor Springs History Museum. Eric is currently an adjunct instructor on Odawa history at North Central Michigan College, Petoskey Michigan. Eric is also a former member of the National NAGRPA Review Committee and the Michigan Commission on the Commemoration of the Bicentennial of the War of 1812. He was a contributing writer and editor of the Emmet County's popular *Essence of Emmet* series, a four-part historical publication highlighting specific events and people of the county.

POPULAR BROADWAY CONCERT JULY 9 AT BAY VIEW GREAT FOR FAMILIES

June will be busting out all over, even in early July, as Bay View presents its most popular Sunday night theme, the beloved Broadway vespers concert. The concert, celebrating 60 years of presenting musical theatre in the summer community outside of Petoskey, takes place Sunday, July 9 at 8 p.m. in Hall Auditorium. Children under 18 are free, as they are for most concerts.

For the traditional music theatre goer, the concert begins with selections from the Rodgers and Hammerstein

library, reflecting the mid-century output of the songwriting duo whose work often touched on politics in a way few would dare these days. From there, the audience will join in a sing-along medley called the 60-Year Medley, honoring the anniversary of long-time director Willard Pierce in Bay View, who used to direct the musicals each year, engaging and training young and old in the ways of the theatre. Following this, staples of the repertoire such as *If Ever I Would Leave You* from *Camelot* and Gershwin's *Strike*

Up The Band will delight the crowd on its trip down memory lane.

Not wanting to rest on the laurels of past song writers, the concert then turns to the next generation, featuring selections from *Hamilton*, the youth theatre production of *Alice in Wonderland*, and *The Lion King*. Dr. Kelly Carney was the Executive Director of the Dementia Center for Excellence for Phoebe Ministries, a premier provider of services to older adults in northeastern Pennsylvania. Dr. Carney is a doctoral level licensed psychologist with Board Certification in Geropsychology and maintains national certification as a geriatric care manager.

In her role at Phoebe Ministries, Dr. Carney provides leadership for the development and provision of comprehensive services to individuals with dementia and their caregivers. She also serves as a consultant and trainer for other aging services provider organiza-

tions.

Dr. Carney is actively engaged in the development of innovation models of dementia care, research, publishing and professional presentations to share information about the innovative care practices emerging at Phoebe. Based on more than 20 years of experience, Dr. Carney is a frequently invited speaker on a variety of eldercare topics and has addressed a number of professional groups including Alzheimer's Association International, American Psychological Association, the Gerontological Society of America, the National Association of



Professional Geriatric Care Managers, and the Pioneer Network. She is the first author on a recently released book titled *Transforming Long Term Care: Expanded Roles for Mental Health Professionals* and several other publications related to geriatric behavioral health. In acknowledgement of her expertise, Dr. Carney was appointed by Governor Tom Corbett to serve on the Pennsylvania Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders planning committee and was selected to serve as co-chair for the American Psychological Association Committee on Aging.

Dr. Carney is an active advocate for individuals affected by dementia and their caregivers and participates in a number of volunteer and professional organizations directed at supporting older adults. Dr. Carney will be in Bay View from July 10 until July 13.

TCHAIKOVSKY, HAYDN, AND A WORLD PREMIERE IN BAY VIEW

Amidst international accusations of wire tapping, collusion, and ties to Syria, not all things Russian are controversial! On Wednesday, Bay View Music Festival artists will present its chamber music concert *From Russia, Germany, and America... With Love*. The concert, set to begin at 8pm, features an array of fantastic chamber music, each played by the faculty artists employed by the summer community open to all.

The program is bookended by music from Germany and Russia, in the form of a piano trio by Franz Joseph Haydn and Peter Illych Tchaikovsky. The piano trio is a popular chamber music art form and features international superstar Fangye Sun on the violin, her husband

and cellist Daniel Tressel on the cello, and beloved Bay View faculty member and emerging collaborative pianist Casey Robards, who has an impressive touring resume as well. The interweaving of piano, cello, and violin provide both the expressive melodic beauty expected from all three instruments, but add to it the percussive, driving energy of piano. Ending the concert with Tchaikovsky's Piano Trio in A minor will be a finale not soon forgotten.

In between these two works, the audience will be treated to something quite different from an American composer named Clint Borzoni in its Michigan premiere. The pieces come from a suite of songs called *Sometimes With the One*

I Love and feature soprano Risa Renae Harman along with Casey Robards. Borzoni's "highly original yet lyrical music...[and] natural gift for melody and harmonic structure" (The Huffington Post) has resulted in international performances and premieres. He has written over one hundred pieces, including three full-length operas, two one-act operas, a piano concerto, percussion quartet, work for orchestra, two string quartets, several works for chamber orchestra and over sixty art songs. Additionally, he was the composer for the musical *My Life as a Bald Soprano*, which had an Off-Broadway run at the Midtown International Theater Festival.

The Annual Women's Council Blood Drive in memory of Joyce Bailey Jones and in cooperation with the American Red Cross is scheduled for Friday, July 14. Joyce was a long-time Bay View member and cottager who was fatally injured in an auto accident in 2001.

The Blood Drive will be held from 9:30 a.m. until 3:15 p.m. at the American Red Cross building at 2350 Mitchell Park Drive, Petoskey. Appointments can be made on-line at www.redcrossblood.org sponsor code is Bayview or by calling 1-800-733-2767 or Jan McDermott at

(651) 210-3408; walk-in donors are also welcome. Please remember that a photo ID or Red Cross Donor Card is required to donate. Donors are encouraged to drink plenty of water the day prior to and the day of donation; if it is unusually warm, be sure to increase fluid intake. Eating red meats and raisins, turkey and other iron rich foods is also helpful in attaining a hemoglobin level satisfactory for donating.

Donors must be at least 17 years old, weigh at least 110 lbs. and be in good general health. There is no upper age

limit as long as one is in good health. Most medications do not disqualify one for blood donation other than those which are used to thin the blood.

Persons with diabetes or high blood pressure are considered healthy if the condition is being treated and is under control. Healthy means that the donor feels well and can perform normal activities. Blood can be donated every eight weeks. Please remember to donate on July 14!

NEW PRODUCTION OF PIPPIN TAKES STAGE IN PETOSKEY

BAY VIEW, MI – In a brand new production, Chicago-based stage director George Cederquist brings a fresh take to the award-winning musical *Pippin*, which opens on July 13 and plays for three nights in Bay View, completing their 60th year of producing summer musicals. This coming of age tale has its hero Pippin exploring the glories of war, the temptations of love, and the intrigues of political power before discovering that happiness lies not in the extraordinary but in the ordinary moments of the everyday. The story is undergirded by questions of how technology causes us to struggle to connect with others, despite being electronically connected more than ever. The show is normally recommended as PG-13 for its adult themes and suggestive dance style, but Bay View's production focuses its attention on the conflicts of being a Millennial, rather than on jazz hands and racy costumes.

Re-imagined as a late night TV show talk such as Jimmy Fallon or Trevor Noah, Pippin (played by regional favorite Quentin Fettig), is led into all sorts of scenarios by the talk show host Leading Player (Stephan Wilson). The host introduces Pippin and his father Charles, (Toby Jones) a tyrannical CEO and business mogul. Soon a young widow named Catherine (Chandler Cummings), comes into Pippin's life with her child Thea played by Eloise Jones, and Pippin explores life as a part of a family. The cast also includes Jennifer Bolton as Berthe, the Hippie grandmother of Pippin who has great advice on how to stay focused and content in life. Finally, the cast of 30 is joined by the opera stars enrolled in the conservatory's "Carmen", giving the show a blockbuster sound audiences have come to expect of a Bay View production.

Pippin opened in 1972 and ran on

Broadway for 1,944 performances with choreography by Bob Fosse and a score by Stephen Schwartz. After writing "*Godspell*", Schwartz jumped from Off-Broadway to On- with the extravagant score of *Pippin*. Still to come from him were other Broadway hits *Wicked*, *Working*, *Children of Eden* and the Disney films *Pocahontas* and *The Hunchback of Notre Dame* and many more. Stage director George Cederquist said "Over the years, I've intersected with *PIPPIN* in many ways: as performer, instrumentalist and audience member. Every time, I've always thought hardest thing to define in this show is the frame around the central narrative. But it is possible to find another frame? What if the story of this young man wasn't told by a mythic travelling troupe of fabled players, but by his own contemporaries, writ large, broadcast for all to see, like an entertaining, late night TV talk show?"

Woods Walks 2017 kick off with a "Barberry Pull" and information on invasive species at 3:00 pm, Thursday, July 13 at the Gateway Trail entrance on Knapp Ave. Children are welcome with adult supervision. Learn about invasive plant species found in the Bay View Woods and best practice methods to control them.

For those wishing to get their hands dirty, please bring gardening gloves, a

yard waste bag and an implement such as a spade (either hand-sized or full-sized) or hand clippers. A primary focus of the event will be the identification and removal of small barberry plants. This is done by pulling or digging small plants out of the ground and placing them in bags for proper disposal. Larger plants will be identified and mapped for future efforts.

Meet at the Gateway Trail entrance on Knapp Avenue at 3:00 pm. Please wear sturdy footwear and clothing suitable for outdoor work. Insect repellent is highly recommended. Some of the work will be done off trail where ticks may be present. Barberry is known to harbor deer ticks and control of invasive

barberry makes the woods a safer place.

Election Changes & Information

Annual Meeting Election Information for Voting Members of the Bay View Association

The voting membership approved amendments to the Bay View Association's By-Laws at the August 3, 2013 Annual Meeting that affect the voting process in 2017. The date of the Annual Meeting this year is Saturday, August 5, 2017.

The primary change is that voters will have the choice of voting electronically. Simply Voting has been hired as the independent third-party election provider. The Board of Trustees authorized the use of Simply Voting at the May 23, 2014 board meeting. The voter may choose to vote by electronic ballot beginning at midnight Eastern Time on July 13, 2017, and ending at 8 a.m. Eastern

Time on Friday, August 4, 2017.

You are responsible to conduct your vote prior to the official end date and time to be officially tallied. Simply Voting is a system that ensures no more than one vote per voting member and is secure, secret, reliable, easy to use, and may be audited. The voter will enter an "elector ID" and a "password" at the web site.

If the voter chooses to vote by paper ballot, that option will be available from 8:30 a.m. until noon at the Annual Meeting on Saturday, August 5, 2017. Also, absentee ballot requests are available now until

Wednesday, August 2, 2017, at 5 p.m. in the Bay View Business Office. Applications for absentee ballot may be submitted by mail as well, and must be postmarked by July 6, 2017. Voting members may go to the "Members Only" area of the Bay View web site where a PDF of the absentee ballot request form may be printed, filled out, and then emailed to absentee@bayviewassociation.org, or faxed to 231-347-4330.

The absentee voter application must be signed by the voter, per By-Law 70. No one may sign in receipt of an absentee ballot for any other voter.



Did you know that some early visitors to Bay View arrived with horses, cattle, and even swine? It became necessary to employ a poundmaster to care for wayward livestock found wandering around the grounds. Below is an excerpt from the Schedule of Poundmaster's Fees for the Bay View Camp Ground Association circa 1891.

- For impounding horses-each .75
- For impounding cattle- each .50
- For impounding swine-each (by coaxing) .50
- (by driving) .75
