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CAMPOLO OPENS ASSEMBLY SEASON

The 130th Assembly Season at Bay View opens with a Weekend of Faith welcoming Dr. Tony Campolo as the guest minister.

The weekend with Dr. Campolo will begin at 8 p.m. Friday, June 17, in Hall Auditorium. It continues at 10 a.m. Saturday, June 18, at Voorhies Hall.

The first Assembly Season Worship Service occurs at 10:45 a.m. Sunday, June 19, at Hall Auditorium, with Dr. Campolo as speaker.

Tony Campolo is Professor Emeritus of Sociology at Eastern University in St. Davids,

Pennsylvania. For 10 years he served on the faculty of the University of Pennsylvania. He did his undergraduate education at Eastern University and holds a Ph.D. degree from Temple University.

Dr. Campolo is a frequent guest on television shows ranging from "Larry King Live" to "Politically Incorrect," and has been co-host of "Hashing it Out" on the Odyssey Television Network. He is the author of 29 books — a collection of the books will be for sale on the porch of Evelyn Hall.

The founder of the Evangelical Association for the Promotion of

Education, he has organized schools and universities in various Third World Countries as well as creating a variety of ministries for "at-risk" children in urban neighborhoods across North America.

He is married to the former Peggy Davidson, has two children and four grandchildren.

From 10-11 a.m. Monday-Thursday, June 20-23, at Voorhies Hall, Dr. Campolo will be presented in a series of video conversations with discussion following.

TAX BILL CYCLE CHANGES

The Michigan Legislature has approved accelerating the county portion of the property tax bill from winter to summer to offset lost state revenue sharing dollars.

This billing cycle change will be

phased in over a three-year period. Your 2005 summer property tax bill will contain your share of the projected \$42,000 county tax, which will result in an estimated increase of 28 percent over your 2004 Summer Tax.
