LET'S CELEBRATE ... Sunday, June 18, 2006 ... the 131st Assembly Season at Bay View. CELEBRATE ... PLACE (the setting of Bay View and its history) ... PEOPLE (those who have given us our legacy and heritage as we recognize those who have died since we gathered last) ... PRESENCE (the Holy Spirit without whose presence Bay View would just be any place). Worship has long, from the beginning of Bay View, been its reason for being. To celebrate the creation of God in the wonder of the sunrise and sunset, to focus on the teachings of Christ calling us to live out the Word of the Gospel in action, and to allow our awareness of the Holy Spirit to inspire and challenge us keeping us centered on the Love of Christ as our reason for being at Bay View.

The 131st Assembly Season opens Sunday with Holy Communion at 9 a.m. in Crouse Memorial Chapel. Rev. Walter Coffey is the Celebrant. All are invited to the Table. Sunday School for all is at 9:30 a.m. Infants and toddlers are cared for by Carolyn Nelson at Loud Hall from 8:45 a.m. to 12:15 p.m. Children's Sunday School is at Hitchcock Hall with Paul and Elizabeth Nelson. Youth meet at Loud Hall with Caroline Mogavero and Amy Stelling. At 10:30 a.m. "Lemonade and Conversation" will find people outside the Wade Administration Building for a moment of greeting and conversation.

Worship begins at 10:45 a.m. in Hall Auditorium. In our CELEBRATION ... of PLACE, PEOPLE AND PRESENCE, the service will welcome The Rev. Dr. Jeffrey Krehbiel as the preacher, and then as presenter of the Bishop Thomas M. Pryor Lectures Monday through Thursday at 10 a.m. in Voorhies Hall. Dr. Krehbiel is a graduate of Hope College at Holland, Mich. His M. Div. is from McCormick Theological Seminary, Chicago, and his D. Min. from Columbia Theological Seminary, Decatur, Georgia. He is a native of Ann Arbor, Mich.; a Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) minister with over 18 years experience in urban ministry before coming to Church of the Pilgrims in Washington, D.C. An award-winning preacher, his ministry centers on a witness to the gospel in common life in our pluralistic, post-modern, post-Christian era. The sermon topic for Sunday is "Living With Roman Coins In Our Pocket" with the scripture reference from Matthew. His theme for the Monday-Thursday lectures is "The Gospel and Post-Modern Culture." Monday he will speak to: "Naming Our Present Moment"; Tuesday, "The Gospel in Global Context"; Wednesday, "The Practicing Congregation"; and Thursday, "Cultivating Communities of the Holy Spirit."

OPENING NIGHT SUNDAY FOR VESPERS

At 8 p.m. Sunday, June 18, Bay View will open its doors once again for the first Vesper Concert of the Assembly Season. *We Gather Together* will be so aptly sung as the first hymn of the Vesper series. We welcome back the Bay View Chorus filled with wonderful singers from lower Northwest Michigan. The Chorus will join with Thomas J. Hart, director, and Anthony J. Patterson, piano, to open the season with Mozart's choral piece, *Come, Holy Spirit*. Note that Mozart will be honored throughout the season in honor of the 250th anniversary of his birth.

New this summer, is the work of award-winning pianist, Lori Sims. She will open with Rachmaninoff's *Prelude in C Minor*. In his second year at Bay View, Richard Kennedy, tenor, will sing two Purcell favorites: *Music for a While* and *We Sing to Him*. Mezzo-soprano Martha J. Hart will perform the exciting aria, "Smania implacabili" from *Così fan tutte*. The Westbrook String Quartet will follow with the Finale from Haydn's *Quartet in G Minor*; *The Rider*. Beethoven's delightful *Rondo in B-flat Major*, performed by Quintessence, will complete this group of classical era works which commenced with the Mozart.

The Bay View Brass Quintet will perform an exciting *Scherzo* of John Cheetam noted for its bravura and flashiness. Brian Eib is welcomed as

the new second trumpet in the quintet this season. On a quieter note, veteran Bay View violinist and Central Michigan University professor Seunghee Lee will perform Fritz Kreisler's *Schoen Rosmarin*. Robert Schumann's famous song, *Widmung*, will be performed by long time Bay View artist baritone Peter Lightfoot. Barbara Chao, flute, follows with her husband, Frederick Chao, cello in Pierne's Finale from *Sonata da Camera*.

Delightful and dance-like, *A Trumpet Minuet* of Alfred Hollins, will be played by Kelly Hale, organist in residence at Bay View. This charming work will be followed by Bizet's fast and flashy *Ouvre ton coeur* sung by Risa Renae Harman, soprano. This portion of the concert is closed by Alexander Goedicke's virtuosic *Concert Etude*, a tour de force for trumpet played by Scott Thornburg. Collaborative pianists for the evening will be Lori Sims, Kelly Hale and Anthony J. Patterson.

The Bay View Chorus rounds out the musical portion of the evening singing H. Owen Reed's popular *Michigan Morn* from *The Michigan Dream*. Reverend R. THEATRE AUDITIONS SET FOR SUNDAY AND MONDAY

With the smell of summer in the air and the excitement of this season's Bay View Music Festival quickly approaching, the Festival Theatre Arts Department, announces auditions for Noel Coward's play *Private Lives* and Cole Porter's musical *Kiss Me, Kate*. These two theatrical gems – along with this season's opera *La traviata* and the youth theatre workshop of Disney's *Jungle Book* – make up the 2006 Summer Theatre Season at Bay View.

Auditions for *Private Lives* and *Kiss Me, Kate* will be held 2:30-6 p.m. Sunday, June 18, and 7-10 p.m. Monday, June 19 in Loud Hall. *Private Lives* will run Thursday, Friday and Saturday, July 13, 14, and 15, and *Kiss Me, Kate* will run Thursday, Friday and Saturday, July 27, 28, and 29. Rehearsals start at 7 p.m. Tuesday, June 20. All auditionees must be available for all performances as well as for the entire 'tech' week before the productions open. All auditionees are asked to come with a list of potential conflicts.

When asked about the audition process, Director of Theatre Arts Mark Kobak stated, "This summer we are trying something different: we would like everyone to audition for both productions. We want to cast a company of actors that will fill the roles for both productions. There is the possibility that performers will be cast in both

productions, and we will work out the rehearsal schedule accordingly. Most people, however, will be cast in one or the other. This will give actors a greater opportunity to be cast and to work with the great artistic teams at Bay View."

When auditioning for *Private Lives*, actors are asked to prepare a comic monologue and/or be prepared to read from the script. People 20 and older are encouraged to audition even if they are not able to prepare a monologue. Two roles are available for a man in his early to mid 30s and a woman in her late 20s or early 30s. There is a third role available, the maid/butler.

The story of a divorced couple, both recently remarried, is thought to be Coward's ultimate artistic achievement. This comedy depicts the couple that has unknowingly booked their honeymoon suites in the same hotel, one door away from each other. The laughter unfolds throughout this rollercoaster of emotions as they discover that they still care for one another. How will their new spouses react? Mr. Bard Suverkrop, returning for his fourth season with Bay View, directs this delightful 1930 comedy.

Singers, dancers, and character actors are needed for Porter's romantic comedy *Kiss Me, Kate*. When auditioning for *Kiss Me, Kate*, performers are

asked to dress for movement and come prepared to sing; an accompanist is provided. Auditionees should also prepare a monologue. People 16 and older are encouraged to audition even if they are not able to prepare a monologue. The masterful Cole Porter composed a scintillating score for *Kiss Me, Kate* with hits like *Wunderbar*, *Another Op'nin, Another Show*, *Too Darn Hot*, and *So In Love*, as well as the always show-stopping *Brush Up You Shakespeare*. The show is the ultimate battle of the sexes as sassy Lilli Vanessi and egotistical Fred Graham reignite their love for each other as they prepare to open a musical version of *The Taming of the Shrew* in steamy 1948 Baltimore. Chaos and confusion ensue when gangsters show up to collect on an IOU from Fred, and Lilli receives a bouquet of flowers from him that was intended for another member of the cast.

A top-notch production team has been assembled for this season, and theatregoers are reminded to purchase tickets early. These popular productions will surely sell out quickly. An enthusiastic team of volunteers is already counting the days until we channel our favorite "fun" activities of walking and rocking into outreach for others, with the 2nd Petoskey-Bay View CROP Walk.

The Walk-Rock is set to kick off at 9 a.m. Saturday, July 15, with registration at 8:30 a.m. at Evelyn Hall. A special route again is planned for "wheeled" participants. New this year, a 2-mile Walk Extension is being organized to the Petoskey waterfront for those wishing to take a longer route.

FESTIVAL SERIES OPENS WEDNESDAY, JUNE 21

At 8 p.m. Wednesday, June 21, the Bay View Music Festival presents the first program of its 2006 classical series in John M. Hall Auditorium. There will be a Pre-Concert Chat at 7:15 p.m. in Crouse Memorial Chapel.

Kelly Hale, organist-in-residence, will commence this evening's concert with *Piece Heroique* of Cesar Franck, noted French composer and organist. This work of Franck is the third piece from a group of three pieces.

The next portion of the concert is played by Carl Donakowski, Bay View cellist-in-residence. He will play a work of Mozart that was never finished by the composer, but was completed by a living composer, John Hilliard. Hilliard is a colleague of the cellist and was commissioned to complete the Mozart *Andantino for Cello and Piano* (1782), Mozart's only work for solo cello. Mr. Hilliard was given permission to use fragments of other Mozart compositions to start his compositional journey with only the original 33 measures from Mozart's hand. Finally, this portion of the concert will conclude with Hilliard's own composition, *Mosaics on Mozart*. Lori Sims will be the collaborative pianist for both works.

Robert Schumann's *Frauenliebe und leben* will be performed by Bay View's mezzo-soprano-in-residence, Martha J. Hart. This significant song cycle follows the heart's longing for love through the lovers meeting, to marriage, and finally to eventual loss. Schumann's gift for intertwining the vocal and piano lines is at its best in this song cycle. Kelly Hale, piano, will join Martha Hart in this performance.

Johannes Brahms was a protege of Robert Schumann and lifelong admirer of his wife, Clara. Schumann signaled young Brahms as the new young genius which is very evident in this third and final piano trio. The impassioned *Piano Trio Number 3 in C Minor* will close this concert with Bay View Artists Seunghee Lee, violin, Carl Donakowski, cello and Lori Sims, piano.
