A LETTER FROM PRESIDENT THOMAS C. SHEARER

On behalf of your Board of Trustees, I want to officially welcome you back for the beginning of the 2006 Assembly Season. We encourage you to check your Summer Program book where all activities are listed weekly. If you have any questions about events, tickets and registration, please check with the Business Office.

I want to call your particular attention to the following items:

1. We are in desperate need of a volunteer to organize and lead the ushers for Sunday evening Vesper Concerts. Historically, each campus organization has supplied the ushers for one evening and the ushers for the Wednesday night Festival Concert the same week.

If you are willing to take on this leadership position, please contact the Business Office. We thank Jenny Weeks for serving as Head Usher the past several years.

2. As you have probably observed, the initial repair of the Hall Auditorium roof and masonry is nearly complete. The scaffolding will be removed by the end of the month and access to the main box office and entrance will be restored. Also, the Association's cement subcontractor is completing necessary sidewalk replacement in several areas of the central campus.

Unfortunately, the repairs are in some frequently traveled areas. We anticipate these repairs will

be complete by the end of this week, weather permitting. We apologize for the inconvenience and thank you for your patience.

3. Please be sure to attend one of the two remaining workshops being conducted by the Auditorium Committee and Kingscott Associates, the architectural group retained by the Association to evaluate and recommend future improvements to these heavily used performance venues.
Your input is valued and needed. The next workshop will be held at 9:30 a.m. Saturday, July 1, in Loud Hall.
4. The ad hoc CEO Search Committee will hold its first meeting at 1:30 p.m. today, Friday. This will be the first meeting of the committee since its appointment by the Board of Trustees at the Mid-Winter Board Meeting.

The first meeting will focus on committee purpose, organization, scheduling and process. The committee will periodically report to the Association membership as its work progresses.

We hope you will take full advantage of the many activities, concerts, lectures and recreational events as the summer program unfolds.

'PREACHER'S PREACHER' DR. JAMES A. FORBES JR. TO PREACH, LECTURE AT BAY VIEW NEXT WEEK

The Reverend Dr. James A. Forbes Jr. is the guest preacher/lecturer at Bay View, June 25-29.

On June 1, 1989, he was installed as the fifth Senior Minister of The Riverside Church, New York, N.Y. The 2,400-member church, built by John D. Rockefeller Jr. in 1927, is affiliated with the American Baptist Churches and the United Church of Christ. Forbes is the first African-American to serve as Senior Minister of this multicultural congregation. He is an ordained minister in the American Baptist Churches and the Original United Holy Church of America.

He has served as the Associate Professor of Preaching at Union Theological Seminary in New York City. He became the Joe R. Engle Professor of preaching there in 1985 through 1989. When he accepted the pastorate at Riverside he became the Harry Emerson Fosdick Adjunct Professor of Preaching at Union. He also serves on the Core Teaching Staff at Auburn Theological Seminary in New York.

Dr. Forbes is known as the "preacher's preacher" because of his extensive preaching career and his charismatic style. He was named in Newsweek, March 4, 1996, as one of the 12 "most effective preachers" in the

English-speaking world. This Pastor, Educator, Administrator, Community Activist and Interfaith Leader was designated as one of America's greatest Black preachers by Ebony magazine in 1984 and 1993. Dr. Forbes learned to preach and pastor in the parish. In addition, he worked as a campus minister for Virginia Union University in Richmond, Va. He has earned three degrees and has been awarded 13 honorary degrees.

Featured on Bill Moyers "Speaking to Power," he shared his prophetic principles, which have become part of the Mobilization 2004 initiative at The Riverside Church. That year he keynoted most of the "Let Justice Roll" tour sponsored by the National Council of Churches, which promoted the prophetic principles in 15-20 cities across the nation.

Born in 1935 in Burgaw, N.C., he is married to Bettye Franks Forbes. They are the parents of a son, James A. Forbes III.

In addition to preaching at the 10:45 a.m. Assembly Worship Sunday, June 25 in Hall Auditorium, Dr. Forbes will deliver the Dr. Welsey Hager Lectures at the Religion and Life Forum, 10 a.m. Monday-Thursday at Voorhies Hall. (Sermon and lecture topics on page 1.)

FESTIVAL CONCERT CELEBRATES MOZART

The Wednesday, June 28, Festival Concert will honor the 250th anniversary of Mozart's birth.

The concert, in Mozart's honor, will be held at 8 p.m. in Hall Auditorium. At 7:15 p.m. there will be a Pre-concert Chat in Crouse Memorial Chapel.

The concert opens with *Sonate en concert* of Jean-Michel Damase. This work, composed in 1950, is representative of the elegant, French tradition of Debussy and Ravel. It will be performed by Barbara Davis Chao, flute, Frederick Chao, cello and Anthony J. Patterson, piano.

Risa Renae Harman, soprano, will perform "Ach ich liebte, war so gluecklich" from Mozart's opera, *Die Entführung aus dem Serail* (*The Abduction from the Harem*). This aria follows Constanza's dialogue with her abductor, Pasha Selim. Selim expressed his love and his intention to include her in his harem of wives.

Reinhold Gliere's romantic style of composition matched the Soviet gov-

ernment's ideal and he was awarded many prizes and important positions. Scott Thornburg, trumpet, will perform Gliere's *Concerto for Trumpet* with Anthony J. Patterson as the collaborative pianist.

Late in Mozart's life, he became a friend of Anton Stadler, an Austrian clarinet virtuoso. Mozart subsequently wrote the *Clarinet Quintet in A Major*, K. 581, for Stadler in 1789. This work is considered to be one of Mozart's finest chamber music compositions. The quintet demonstrates Mozart's mature mastery by integrating the clarinet into the texture of the string quartet.

John Craig Barker, will be the clarinetist for this performance along with Andrew Bruck and Seunghee Lee, violins; Cynthia Kempf, viola; and Carl Donakowski, cello.

BANNERS, QUILTS ADORNED JUNE 18 WORSHIP SERVICE

From Age to Age . . . Our Hope for Years to Come were the words on the banners hung at the June 18 worship service at Hall Auditorium as the Assembly Season opened with the theme of Celebrate . . . Place, People, Presence.

The banners were designed and created by Artist Millie Janka, who lives at Lake Louise. They were designed for the North Central Jurisdictional Conference of the United Methodist Church held July 12-15, 2000, in Middleton, Wis.

A teacher of calligraphy for 10 plus years in Flint and Birmingham, Mich., she now works in her northwoods Windsongs Studio. Her husband, Ralph, is a retired United Methodist pastor.

She is a member of the Petoskey United Methodist Church where she sings in the choir, plays handbells, and serves on the Worship and Worship Visuals committees. The Janka family has raised Monarch butterflies, setting them free. We are grateful to her for sharing these expressions of faith with us.

The quilt on the Altar Table was designed and created by Tresa Keys, a summer resident of Petoskey, and in the other months a resident of Newark, Ohio. Tresa and her husband, "Skip," are always at worship on Sundays at Bay View as well as participating in other Bay View activities.

She is recognized as a "professional" quilter, having shown and won ribbons for her work at the Quilt Show in Petoskey, and at other settings.

She has designed and given to Bay View a quilt altar cloth used at Memorial Services, initially at the Memorial Service of Col. Bronson Smith (Ret.). Her work is greatly respected and appreciated.

AUDITORIUM WORKSHOP I RESULTS

A SPECIAL REPORT FROM THE AUDITORIUM COMMITTEE

The first of three Bay View-wide Workshops was held Memorial Day weekend. The Auditorium Committee offers this summary in order to keep the membership up to date on the Committee's activities and to encourage continued participation in the next two workshops.

Background

An ad hoc committee formed by the Board of Trustees has been active for three seasons gathering data on the needs and functioning of our current program in our auditorium spaces. This past autumn we bid, interviewed and hired an architectural firm to help determine what possible improvements could be made to our auditorium spaces based on our defined needs, and to price the options.

The Kalamazoo, Mich., firm of Kingscott, along with theatre design consultants Auerbach and acoustic consultants Kirkegaard were hired as our architectural team. The committee specified that three community workshops be conducted to allow all Bay View membership the opportunity to be heard as decisions were made.

Workshop I

Memorial Day weekend was the beginning of the workshop process. Forty-five people participated in the three-hour session. The Kingscott team reviewed the results of its investigation of the Bay View facilities, including results of acoustic testing in both Hall and Voorhies auditoria. Participants worked both individually and in small groups to arrive at consensus on the facility needs for the current Bay View program.

Kingscott was asked by the Auditorium Committee to show what updates could be achieved within three financial ranges: \$3-5 million, \$5-9 million, and \$12 million and up. These ranges became Options 1, 2 and 3.

Option 1

This option would address updates to sound, acoustical, lighting and seating systems in both Hall and Voorhies. The current Bay View program would continue to function as is. Advantages

included a least cost option, some increase in audience comfort and satisfaction, and some technical updates. Disadvantages included no real back stage enhancements and no capability for program growth. This option would cost \$3-5 million.

Option 2

This choice would be an expansion to include all of the updates from Option 1 in addition to significant stage and back stage expansion in Voorhies and a stage extension in Hall.

Kingscott felt that this option involved spending a significant amount of money without really addressing many of our defined needs. This option would cost \$5-9 million.

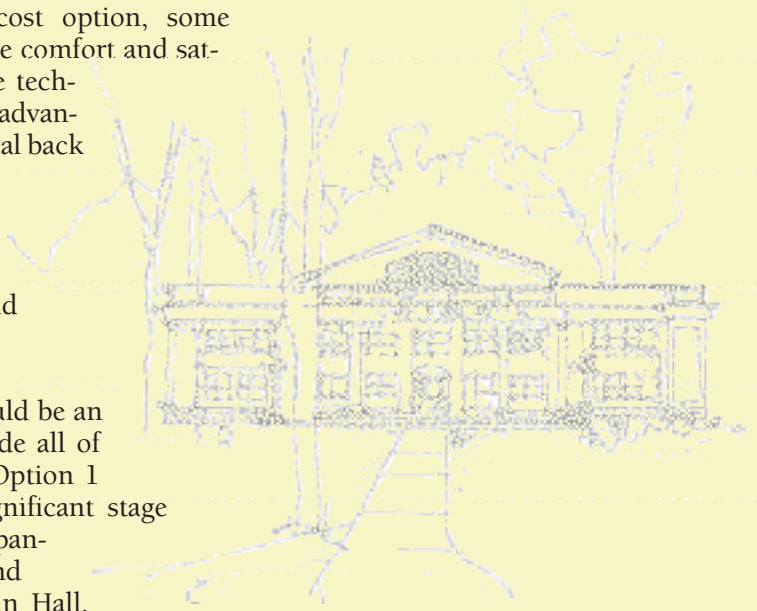
Option 3

Option 3 would provide updates for Hall Auditorium to return its primary function to a worship and music performance space. Voorhies would be reconfigured to function as a lecture space with flexible seating which would allow this to be an open rehearsal space. Additionally, a theatrical/opera/dance facility for a 500-person audience would be built. This option would meet all of the defined needs but is the most expensive choice – \$12 million and up.

Summary

The participants considered the current Bay View program, the identified needs for conducting that program, and the audience expectations. They concluded that Option 3 best addressed the current situation.

Lastly, an exercise was conducted to consider where such a new facility could be placed within Bay View. Three sites were proposed by Kingscott: on the main campus, in Fairview Park (behind Voorhies), or in Sunset Park (site of the old hotel). The main campus was the top choice, however, there was no clear consensus on this point.



What's Next?

Option 3 is not a "done deal". Bay View has had a first look at comparing its current program with an optimum means of addressing identified needs. In the studies and data collection in the past three years there have been no costs determined. It is the correct time in the process to see what current dollars can buy.

This identification brings up a whole new set of questions. Does Bay View want to continue with the current program? Can Bay View increase the business management side of the program? How much money can Bay View raise and by what method?

There is a long road ahead. The Board of Trustees is also considering these questions and Bay View members are encouraged to continue to think through these same points.

Two more workshops are planned this summer: Workshop II will be 9:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m. Saturday, July 1, in Loud Hall. Workshop III will be 2-5 p.m. Saturday, July 29, in Evelyn Hall. Please plan to attend.

BAY VIEW TO GLOW DURING ILLUMINATION WEEK

In the 1890s, Bay View, as well as other Chautauquas, had an annual celebration called "Illumination Night." Bay View's parks and grounds were beautifully illuminated with Japanese lanterns. A great many private cottages were illuminated with lanterns, too.

Taken from an August 1899 Bay View publication are these words: "Yesterday was the Annual Reception Day in Bay View. Receptions were given in four different public halls last evening. The parks and grounds were beautifully illuminated with Japanese lanterns from dusk until 10:30 o'clock.

Many strangers who had come to hear William Jennings Bryan in the afternoon remained over to see the Celebration. A great many private cottages were illuminated with lanterns. Hitchcock Hall looked like a fairy castle with all its Japanese lanterns which hung in numbers in the trees in front of the Hall and on the broad verandas and formed avenues leading up to the front steps . . ."

"Illumination Week" will be Sunday-Saturday, July 2-8, this year. Dust off your lantern and display it throughout that week for beautiful celebration in 2006.
