UNIQUE QUARTET PRESENTS CROUSE CONCERT

Hall Auditorium will play host to the season's only Virginia Crouse Visiting Artist Concert when Antares performs at 8 p.m. Saturday, July 8.

Comprised of four virtuoso instrumentalists – clarinet, violin, cello and piano – Antares draws from a vast and colorful repertoire for the piano-clarinet-strings quartet formation, as well as its various trio and duo permutations. This versatility allows Antares to create programs which span the eras of classical music through the music of today, earning multiple awards and rave reviews.

Antares has performed at the Kennedy Center, Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall and on National Public Radio. Residencies include Aspen and Eastman schools of music, and Columbia and Wesleyan universities.

Among Antares' festival appearances are the Chautauqua Institution and the Great Lakes Chamber Music Festival. Antares has commissioned and/or premiered many works by highly regarded composers, and in 2005 released its debut CD, *Eclipse*.

Widely admired and sought after for educational outreach, Antares' work in this area includes K-12 classrooms, general audiences and ensemble coaching. The group will present two Master Classes at 10 a.m. Friday, July 7; a

2006 MUSEUM EXHIBIT CHANGED

Due to the structural problems that occurred in Hall Auditorium this past winter, the Bay View Historical Museum's entire collection was moved to protect it from water damage.

The hurried move to safety scrambled the collection, necessitating the entire summer to be spent reorganizing hundred of boxes. The originally planned 2006 Exhibit has been rescheduled for the summer of 2007.

The Bay View Historical Museum originally planned to feature the various, functional uses that occupied the Museum buildings throughout the years: speakers stand and bookstore, arts and crafts shop, beauty salon and the original Boys' and Girls' Club.

The Museum Commission sincerely appreciated the efforts of Dave Ellis and his crew for saving an enormous amount of vintage clothing and valuable artifacts. In the meantime, this season the Museum Buildings will display 50's vintage clothing taken from boxes "within reach," Victorian furniture and décor already stored safely in Building #1, and an informative exhibition by David Krause of one of Bay View's earliest trustees and settlers, O.S. Knapp.

The newly released DVD "In Celebration of Bay View," will be available for sale for \$8 in the Museum as will "Bay View, Summer City of Michigan," a remarkable replication of the book originally published in 1894.

Beginning the week of July 2, the Museum will be open 2:30-4:30 p.m. Wednesdays and Sundays after Church until 1 p.m.

REV. LOUISE OTT TO PREACH SUNDAY

A death in the family of Dr. Douglas W. Vernon has made it necessary that he be with his family over this week-end. However, he will be present to deliver the Monday-Thursday lectures at Voorhies Hall.

In his place, the Rev. Louise R. Ott is the July 2 Bay View Preacher.

Louise Ott served as the Summer Youth Minister at Bay View for the years 1985-1987. She is currently the District Superintendent of the Saginaw Bay District of the Detroit Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church. The district she cares for is an area encompassing churches in much of the Northeastern portion of the Lower Peninsula.

Her prior appointments include the Peck, Buel, and Melvin United Methodist Churches; Ypsilanti First UMC, where she was an Associate Pastor; and Novi UMC. She was elected to the 2004 General Conference, and the Jurisdictional Delegation in 1996, 2000 and 2004. She was a delegate to the World Methodist Council in 2001. She holds a B.S. in Psychology from Michigan State University, an M. Div. from Garrett-Evangelical Seminary, and is qualified for the

Myers-Briggs Type Indicator.

Softball, hiking, golf, sci-fi novels, movies, fishing and choral singing are among her interests. When she is not lost in Myers-Briggs, church growth theories, and spirituality books – among other things – she plays the piano for her own enjoyment, and the guitar to keep Punkin, the housecat, crying for relief.

She has selected Luke 13:10-17 and Mark 2:27 as the scripture references for her sermon topic: "Taking Tradition to Task."

The Rev. Douglas W. Vernon, senior pastor of First United Methodist Church of Kalamazoo, Michigan, will speak the Samuel and Ivery Brown and Carl and Janet Dauler Lectures at 10 a.m. Monday, Wednesday and Thursday at Voorhies Hall.

He will focus on Celtic History using as his topics: "Rediscovery of an (almost) Lost Tradition"; "Columba, Patrick and Other Celtic Saints"; "The Iona Community - Ancient-Future Christianity"; and "Do You Need To Be Irish or Is This For Everybody?"

There will not be a lecture on Tuesday, July 4.

AMERICAN MUSIC FEATURED AT JULY 5 FESTIVAL CONCERT

At 8 p.m. Wednesday, July 5, the Bay View Music Festival will present a program of American music in John M. Hall Auditorium.

The program will feature a variety of music pointing to the many aspects of American culture and the diversity of its people: from *The Star-Spangled Banner*, Black America, Stephen Foster, the hurricane tragedy in New Orleans to the Armed Forces who support our country.

The concert opens with *Concert Variations on The Star-Spangled Banner* of Dudley Buck. Our national anthem originated as a British drinking song! This work will be played at the organ by Kelly Hale.

The Bay View Brass Quintet will perform three well-known spirituals arranged by Enrique Crespo. *Joshua*

Fought the Battle of Jericho, *Nobody Knows the Trouble I've Seen* and *Swing Low, Sweet Chariot*, are all spirituals that possibly originated in the campground meetings which swept through the South in the early 19th century.

Stephen Foster is regarded as America's first great songwriter. He was actually born on July 4! Two of his nearly 150 songs will be performed by Richard Kennedy, tenor: *Jeanie with the Light Brown Hair* and *If You've Only Got a Moustache*. The latter song offers coy advice to bachelors!

Lalo Schifrin has written a work entitled *La Nouvelle Orleans*. Quintessence, Bay View's woodwind quintet in residence, will perform this work as we acknowledge the devastation of New Orleans and the surrounding regions of our country. Mr.

Schifrin's work has strong jazz influences.

In a career that parallels that of Schifrin's, Richard Rodney Bennett was also a jazz musician. Like Mr. Schifrin, he also composed music for the cinema. *The Four Piece Suite* for two pianos is a delightful work that mirrors some of the stylistic traits of his film music. The pianists for this charming suite are Kelly Hale and Anthony J. Patterson. These pianists are also the collaborative pianists for the evening's concert.

The Brass Quintet will appear at the closing of the concert to pay homage to our armed forces. The work that they will perform is entitled *Armed Forces Salute* and is arranged by Jari Villanueva, Professor of Music at the University of Maryland.
