Leading the Bay View Worship Service at 10:45 a.m., Sunday, June 13, in Hall Auditorium will be the Rev. Louise Riggins Seipel.

The Rev. Seipel (“Lou”) has spent nearly 30 years in service to The United Methodist Church. For over 20 years she served United Methodist churches as senior pastor.

At present, she serves the poor through the Community Properties Impact Corp., a public housing organization. She has a B.A. from Greensboro College in Greensboro, N.C., and a Master of Divinity from the Methodist Theological School in Delaware, Ohio.

An ordained elder in the West Ohio United Methodist Annual Conference, she is also a Bridges Out of Poverty Certified Trainer.

Her sermon title will be “Of Saints and Sinkers.” Scripture will be Matthew 14:22-33. As part of the Religion and Life Forum’s Louise Garman lectures, the Rev. Seipel will explore the theme, “A Sinker’s Journey to Discipleship.”

The lectures are scheduled for 10-11 a.m., Monday-Thursday, June 14-17, in Voorhies Hall. Lecture titles include: Monday – “Things That Make You Want to Go ‘Hmmmm’...”; Tuesday – “A Little Dab Will Do You”; Wednesday – “Smile, Breath and Go Slowly-Thich Nhat Hanh”; Thursday – “First, Break

Theological Studies. She is currently a member of the YMCA Board of Trustees, the MAP Furniture Bank Board of Trustees, and the Homeless Families Foundation Board of Trustees.

From 2004 to 2008, she served as director of supportive services and vice president (since 2008) of the Community Impact Corp., managing support services staff as well as overseeing service delivery systems, grant applications, community relations, partnership development, public relations and research and development.

Community Impact Corp. is part of the Community Properties Corp. In April 2003, the Ohio Capital Corp. for

Housing launched the acquisition and rehabilitation of 1,335 affordable housing units and formed Community Properties of Ohio Management Services. This initiative relied heavily on many significant partnerships, including the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), Campus Partners, United Way of Central Ohio, and numerous other service agencies.

Lou is married to Craig Seipel, and has two sons, Zachary and Sam. Zachary is a 2010 graduate of Virginia Military Institute and was commissioned as a second lieutenant in the Army. Sam is currently a senior at Baldwin-Wallace College in Berea, Ohio. Lou and Craig live in Powell, Ohio.

Tree trimmers headed to Bay View

A sometimes dreaded but necessary service will occur in Bay View next week – tree trimming.

The City of Petoskey has contracted with Asplundh Tree Removal to trim the trees and vegetation that may create problems for power lines during inclement weather.

One of the most common causes of power outages during storms is a tree limb falling on lines and bringing them down. An aggressive tree-trimming

program can have a significant impact on reducing outages.

Asplundh is an 80-year-old international company that specializes in clearing line right-of-way. It will be working in the entire service area and will be in Bay View next week.

The Petoskey Public Works Department expects trimming in Bay

View to be completed in approximately five to six days.

Only those trees that present a hazard to power lines will be trimmed, and only the foliage necessary. Workers will chip the material on site as it is cut.
